SCHOOL NEWS (K-12th GRADES)

March Builder Theme: I am a builder when I am willing to try and believe in my ability to succeed. Have you ever watched ants? Ants can carry 50 times their own body weight, and they will work together in small or large groups to move even heavy objects. Most ants can survive around 24 hours underwater. Ants are the longest living of all insects, living for up to 30 years. Ants move an estimated 50 tons of soil per year in one square mile. *Ants are the epitome of belief in ability to succeed.* Watching ants makes me wonder, “How do children gain belief in their ability to succeed?” I think the ants show us that it comes from struggle. But because struggle brings mistakes and failure, it is sometimes a hard gift to give our children. When they are uncomfortable, or sad, or overwhelmed, it is *so* tempting to lower expectations and adjust the goal. Yet there is so much value to be gained by not doing that. Mistakes are part of the process and are wonderful learning opportunities that strengthen self-esteem. Failure prepares children for the real world. Quick fixes or rescues cause false beliefs that don’t bring lasting results. Struggle is good for the brain. Although it may be hard to not remove the struggle, children need to be challenged in order to gain their own belief in themselves and their abilities. Our children are best served if we help them develop the skills necessary to, like ants, “move heavy objects”, and “survive underwater” for a while. This is where they learn that they have the ability to succeed.

ELEMENTARY NEWS (K-6)

Academic Update – Reading University Book Referrals:

Our Reading University List was compiled by the amazing parents of students at APA! Books are included on the booklist based on the following criteria:

- Does the book have an original, well-constructed plot; well developed, multidimensional character(s); and a setting that is well established and clearly defined?
- Does the book teach values such as honesty, kindness; cooperation; courage, and other values we wish our students to internalize?
- Is the overall message of the book true, or just, or moral?
- Does the book nourish the intellect and stimulate the imagination?
- Does the book have a timeless quality that spans all ages and allows it to be enjoyed by all?

In addition, non-fiction works are selected on the following basis

- Is the book written accurately?
- Is it conducive to independent reading /learning—not requiring extensive background knowledge or explanation by an adult?
- Does the book enrich subject matter and concepts consistent with APA curriculum?

Furthermore, books for primary grades are evaluated according to some additional criteria:

- Is the book appealing to children?
- Does the book reinforce concepts such as numbers and counting, rhyming, sequencing, comparing, patterning, vocabulary skills, making predictions, reading out loud, etc?
- Are the illustrations artistically stimulating?
- Do they present an excellent pictorial representation of the story?
- Do the illustrations introduce various artistic techniques and mediums, such as watercolor, oil, collage, pen and ink, etc?

If there's a book you feel should be on our Reading University List, please complete the Reading University Referral Form on the our website and submit it to the Elementary Academic Office for review.

SECONDARY NEWS (7th-12th Grade)

The most unavoidable thing about parenting preteens and teens is that they will inevitably grow bigger. Our students are rising upward and getting taller all over the school. You may be asking yourself, why we are addressing this in the newsletter? One area where this growth is most evident is in uniforms which are getting a little small on many of our students. Uniforms are required to be in good repair and fit appropriately. This includes, among other things, pant fit, sweater repair and fit, skirt length/fit, and shirt fit. Please see a brief review of the uniform guidelines below. Upon return from the break, the above listed points will be enforced in full. Clothing must not be too tight, short or in disrepair.

Lower Body

1. Slacks must fit the following description: Uniform slacks (no denim, tight-fitting, or corduroy). Belted, pleated or flat front, long enough to cover top of shoe, short enough to stay off floor when worn with shoes, worn no more than 2” below waist, no cargo pants or outside pockets (patch pockets), match color of Dockers or Lee khaki (not stone colored). 1. No tight-fitting slacks (must be able to pinch one inch of fabric in front and back). Slacks may NOT be tapered. **They may not be skinnier at the ankle than at the knee.**
2. Leggings may be worn under skirts. Must be black or navy-blue in K-12 and with an option of white in K-6, and full-length to the ankle. **Socks must come to the bottom of the leggings.**
3. Bicycle-type shorts are required under skirts for playground activities.
4. Skirts/Jumpers must come to the knee when standing **and sitting**...

It has once again come to our attention that many of our Elementary, Junior High and younger High School students are utilizing social media. Many of our students who are on social media are also using it improperly. **We are excited to announce that in March we will be holding a social media night.** We look forward to helping parents understand the perils of social media in the hands of students who lack the maturity to use it. We will require some students and families to attend, while encouraging others and all families to attend with their students. All are invited. Please note the section of our Parent Student Handbook which encourages all families to terminate the use of social media amongst students at APA. *“Similarly, American Preparatory Academy recommends a ‘no Social Media’ policy for students until 11th grade.”* Recent evidence shows that there are potentially damaging effects on pre and young teens who engage in use of social media without the proper maturity and brain development.”
